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Description

The woodland is accessed off the South Deeside road which is a long, straight road that although not terribly busy, the traffic can really take advantage of it so extra care must be taken when entering or leaving by car.

There are two gates for accessing the wood in a bit of a horseshoe shape with plenty of room for parking if any woodland owner does not want to take their car all the way up to their particular wood.

The walk up is through mature beech trees which create a wonderful shady canopy, bearing left all the way until reaching the entrance to Jarl Wood. The track extends all the way through Jarl Wood with a wider area further in that could be the perfect site for a small cabin. The beech trees have a great sense of majesty. A bench has been installed slightly further up the rise in land from the entrance to allow you to sit and reflect.

These are very beautiful woods with views across farmland that can be seen the higher up you rise, towards the western boundary there are some very tall pines and younger birch, creating a nice contrast with the beech. The woods are well worth a trip out to see, perhaps combined with further exploration of the spectacular Royal Deeside.

The purchasers of the woodland will be asked to enter into a [covenant](#) to ensure the quiet and peaceful enjoyment of adjoining woodlands and meadows.

Trees

Jarl Wood is dominated by mature beech trees across three quarters of the woodland and by pine and birch towards the eastern boundary. Beech woodland is shady and characterised by a dense carpet of fallen leaves and mast husks which prevent most woodland plants from growing. Only specialist shade-tolerant plants can survive beneath a beech canopy.

Because beech trees live for so long, they provide gnarled and knotted habitats for many deadwood specialists, such as hole-nesting birds and wood-boring insects. The bark is often home to a variety of fungi, mosses and lichens.

Wildlife

Craiglug Woods are a real haven for wildlife with plenty of animal trails criss-crossing the woodland, though whether they would be seen in daylight is doubtful. Careful placement of wildlife cams would reveal many of the inhabitants.

Features

Beech trees are known as the queen of British trees, with the oak being the king and, although usually seen, as native to the south of England they are very common north of the border. The amount of timber in just one of these trees is impressive and would provide good firewood for hungry burners.

Access, tracks and footpaths

The woodland tracks have recently been upgraded with local stone allowing great accessibility to all the woods at Craiglug, the woodland itself is well spaced allowing free movement.

Rights and covenants

All sporting and mineral rights are sold with the wood.

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Activities

These woodlands have great potential for siting a woodland hut subject of course to the relevant planning permissions required. It is a wonderful location for exploring Royal Deeside and further into the Cairngorm mountain range.

Local area and history

Royal Deeside is the name given to the valley of the River Dee from its birth on the slopes of the Cairngorm Mountains to the North Sea at Aberdeen. On its journey, the river flows through some of the most beautiful countryside in Scotland.

There are several historic castles located in Deeside. At Braemar, the crumbling ruins of [Kindrochit Castle](#) date back to the 11th century. At the east end of Braemar stands the 16th-century tower house of [Braemar Castle](#). Braemar itself is famous as the site of the annual Highland Gathering, the most prestigious of Scotland's Highland Games, which can trace their origins back to a festival given by Malcolm Canmore following his victory over Macbeth here in the 11th century.

The 16th-century tower house of [Crathes Castle](#) at Banchory features world-famous gardens, and only a few miles away is the 13th-century fortress of [Drum Castle](#), one of the oldest tower houses in the country. Just outside Royal Deeside are [Craigievar Castle](#), [Corgarff Castle](#), and [Dunnottar Castle](#).

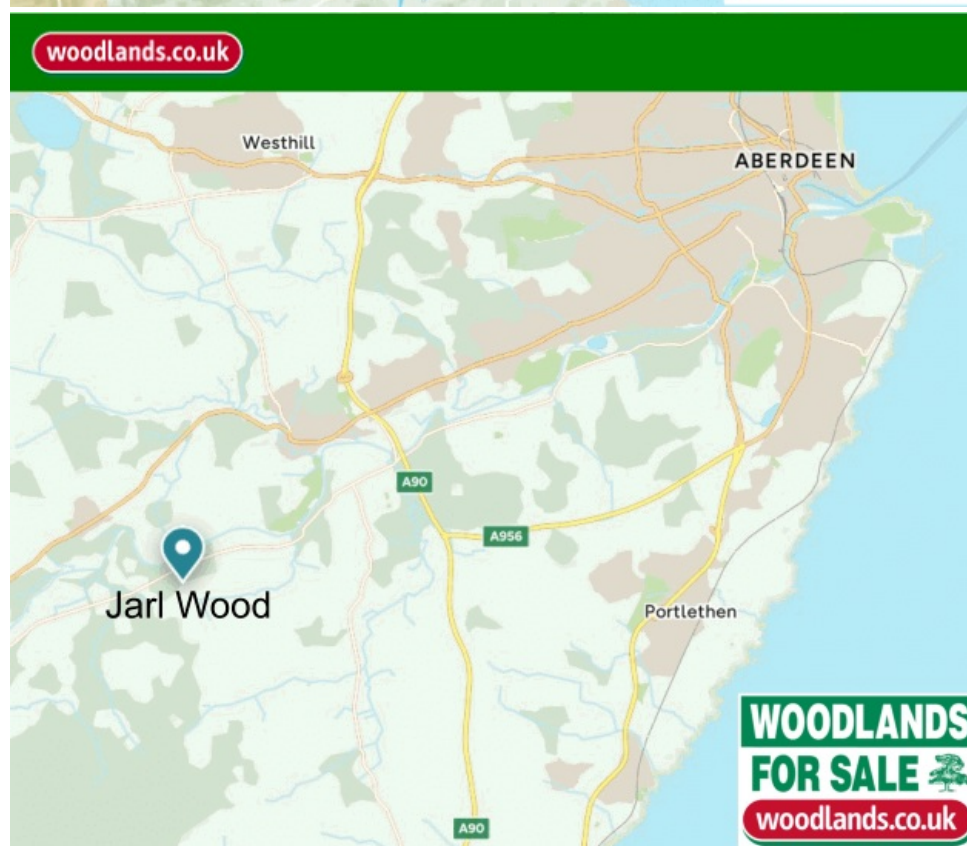

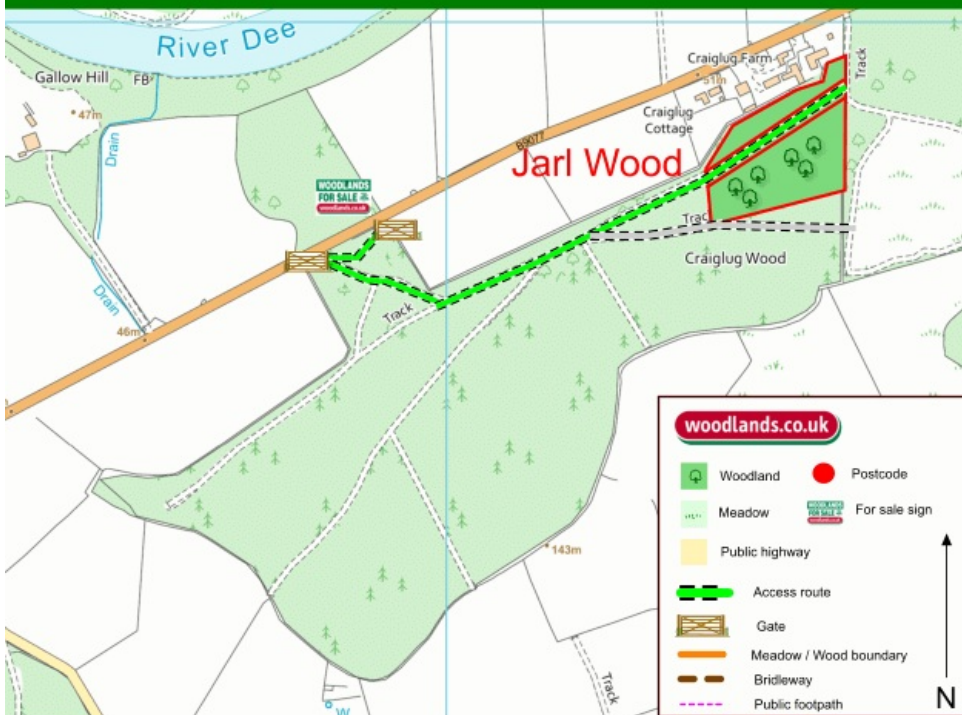
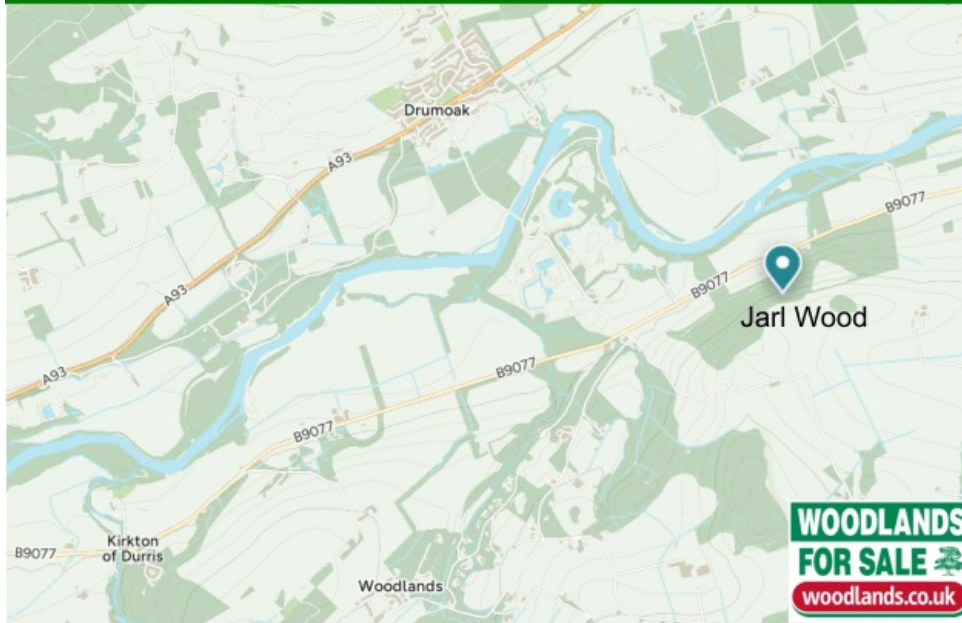
Directions

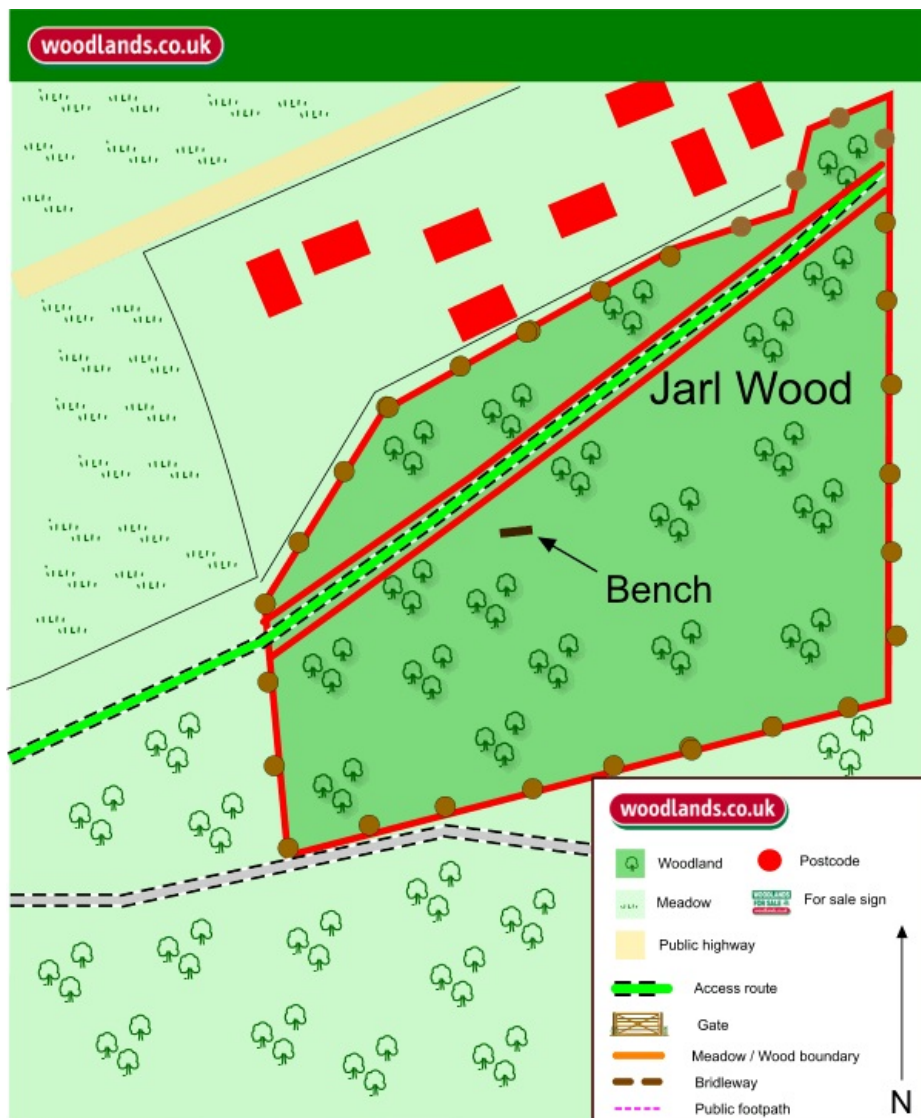
- From the A90 western periphery road that bypasses Aberdeen take the turnoff for Peterculter onto the B979
- Go down from here back across the river and join the B9077 turning right. (south deeside road)
- Carry along here for about 3 miles.
- You will come across a woodlands for sale sign on your left and then half a mile further a sign on your right
- The entrance to the woods are opposite the sign on your left hand side.
- Park here and try to leave room for a car to get into or out of the gate.
- Walk up the internal track bearing left until you reach the end and the entrance to Jarl Wood

Boundaries:

Boundaries are marked by red painted post tops on two sides, and stone walls on the other two sides.
